Course Description: This course will consider the political, economic, and social dimensions of early Western civilization to 1500 CE. We will look at developments in literature, visual arts, religion, philosophy and culture in order to gain a better understanding of these early chapters in our history and learn how they also inform our present reality.

Course Objectives:

1. Students will learn about and be able to recognize different historical periods in Western civilization.
2. Students will gain familiarity with texts, artwork, architecture, and cultural trends from this era.
3. Students will increase their critical thinking skills through writing and analysis exercises.

Quizzes: (100 points total) We will have weekly reading assignments and corresponding quizzes for each chapter. The quizzes will be completed in Webcourses (see quizzes, menu on left side) and will be displayed one week before the due date. These quizzes will be timed and you should complete the reading assignment before beginning the homework. The homework assignments are worth 10 points each and are due by the end of day on each Sunday (11:59 pm EST) immediately following the week the chapters are assigned. Please complete your work on time (**the assignment will time out after the due date, late work will not be accepted.**).

Essay Assignment (100 points): There will also be one essay (100 points) based on Chapter 6, due at the end of Week 3. I will give you more information for the essay as the semester continues, posted in Modules. **The assignment will time out after the due date and late work will not be accepted.**

The quizzes and/or essay cannot be made up unless there is an EMERGENCY situation (hospitalization, death in immediate family, etc.) that absolutely prevents you from completing the work on time. This situation MUST be documented and you MUST contact me immediately in order to inform me of the situation. Extensions will be given **only at the discretion of the instructor and in very rare circumstances.**
