I. Course Objective and Description:

This course explores the global developments and exchanges of ideas and arts forms of the Post-Renaissance and Baroque worlds from the mid-17th century to the present. Special attention will be given to western and non-western cultures, including the interrelated elements of art, literature, architecture, music, philosophy, religion, and politics. Each of the cultural elements will be examined for evidence of primary themes, values, and ideas present in the selected societies. We will also look at the presence or potential application of historical value systems in the modern world. By the end of the semester students should be able to: a) identify and discuss key elements from the course in an analytical manner; b) demonstrate basic research ability and presentation skills at university level; and c) fulfill the State of Florida Gordon Rule requirement.

Each time you actively participate in class discussion outside of group discussion, you will earn 0.25 points.

- Starting Week 2, please **print and submit TWO questions and/or discussion topics** based on your reading-assignments;

Reading Questions grading criteria:

For each "so-so" (meaning, you read the materials and asked relevant questions) assignment, 0.15 points.

For each "great" (meaning, you knew the materials well and asked intelligent questions) assignment, 0.25 points.

For each "outstanding" (meaning, your well-crafted, thoughtful question was selected and shared with the class) assignment, 0.35 points ☺

❖ **Two In-Class Quiz (6 points = 3 points each)**

There will be TWO quizzes based on the Yolen, and other PDF readings.

Each in-class quiz will be consisted of multiple choice and/or short writing components (~100-200 words).

❖ **Three Exams (45 points = 3 x 15 points each, with Essay Questions)**

Each exam will include:

- a multiple-choice portion, which will be given in class** (5 points)
- an essay portion, which will be completed as a 3-5 pages take-home writing assignment and submitted via Webcourses Assignment Tab before NOON on due date** (10 points)

You will have at least one week to complete each of the three take-home essay exams.

Please save your file in Word (.docx) or PDF (.pdf) format.

***Re-submission via Webcourses’ Turnitin portal is allowed until portal is automatically closed before NOON on due date.**

These short essay questions require you to reflect on the readings and class discussions while comparing varying viewpoints, including your own. You should be able to define, describe, and discuss some of the new terms and ideas we learn in class. You **MUST** reflect carefully, and specifically, on the readings and class discussions to get a good grade. Your answer must be well written, follows the *MLA Format and Citation Guidelines*, which may be obtained from your Webcourses’ “Guidelines and Samples” folder.

❖ **Research Proposal (4 points)**

Prepare a **2 -3 pages** (2 pages minimum, *excluding* cover page and reference pages) **research proposal in MLA format**. Further details will be distributed in a separate handout. The proposal should be in the form of a short preliminary research paper, which will be the basis of your **Research Paper** and **Group Presentation**. This assignment prepares you with basic academic research and writing skills, as well as UCF Library resources.

Please **save your essay in Word (.docx) or PDF (.pdf) format and submit via Webcourse. *Re-submission via Webcourse’s Turnitin portal is allowed until portal is automatically closed before NOON on due date.**

❖ **Research Paper (10 points)**

Further details will be distributed in a separate handout.

Please see Webcourse - > Files -> "Samples" folder for Proposal and PPT Samples.

Prepare **a 6 to 8 pages** (6 pages minimum, *excluding* cover page and reference pages) **research paper in MLA format**. The paper could be an extension of the preliminary research paper, but not necessarily so. You could use the more advance Chicago Style. Please **save your essay in Word (.docx) or PDF (.pdf) format and submit via Webcourse**.

***Re-submission via Webcourse's Turnitin portal is allowed until portal is automatically closed before NOON on due date.**

❖ **Group Presentation based on Research Paper (3 Individual Effort + 3 Group Effort)**

You will be sorted into a group of 4-5 students based on your Research Proposal. Each group should identify a common theme. Overall group performance 3 points; individual performance will be peer-reviewed, 3 points.

As a group, you will give **a 30 minutes in-class presentation introducing a) the shared theme and its significance in the humanistic traditions; b) how each of the members' research support the theme.**

You have the freedom to create a presentation file using PowerPoint or any alternative tools, such as Keynote, Presentit, and Visme; however, **you must upload a copy of your presentation in either PowerPoint (.pptx) or PDF (.pdf) format via Webcourses before NOON on your presentation date.**

Please remember, **the Final Exam essay portion will be based on all the class presentations, including your own.**

❖ **Final Exam (15 points = 10 Multiple Choices Portion + 5 Short In-Class Writing Portion)**

Final Exam is mandatory. It will include a multiple-choice portion and a short essay portion.

The multiple-choice portion will include 40 questions based on materials from Chapter 20-38 and will include audio-visual questions. Please do not be late.

The short essay portion will be based on all the student research presentations from this class, including your own. Please bring a blank exam notebook to class on the Final Exam Day.

❖ **Extra Credit (3 points = 1 point sign-in attendance + 2 points one-page field note based on event; or without the field trip, 2 points for a 5 pages MLA format short research paper; see details below)**

Once again, all assignments are graded for quality, not completion.

This includes the Extra Credit field note/ short paper.

Each semester, students are offered the opportunity to attend the Tea Ceremony or the "Tea and Zen" lecture at the Guang Ming Buddhist Temple as the extracurricular cultural emersion component to this course. **Attendance to the event will give you 1 extra credit point. Submission of a two-page MLA format field note based on the visit will give you 2 extra credit points.** However, *this event will be arranged only if more than 15 students from this class sign-up.* The event date will then be finalized – most likely on a weekend.

If you have a working schedule conflict and cannot participate in the field trip, you could still earn up to 2 extra credit points by submitting a five-pages MLA format research paper (excluding cover page or reference page) based on any one of the PDF readings, or the in-class tea ceremony demonstration (to be confirmed).
