Course Description

This course is designed to highlight important literature for brass instruments and address basic concepts for teaching brass instruments.

Student Learning Outcomes

- Students will be able to correctly identify and demonstrate knowledge of significant solo brass literature.
- Students will be able to correctly identify and demonstrate knowledge of significant orchestral and wind band literature relative to brass instruments.
- Students will be able to demonstrate knowledge of pedagogical principles, materials, and techniques applicable to all brass instruments.

Course Activities

Class Assignments & Participation

- You are expected to attend all class meetings. During each meeting both literature and pedagogy will be discussed. You will need to spend time outside of class to listen to and familiarize yourself with the literature that is covered. Assignments will be posted in Webcourses@UCF.
- Teaching Observations Students in the 4000 level class will need to complete <u>2</u> teaching observations and students in the 5000 level class will need to complete <u>4</u>. Please ask permission before observing a lesson. These do not have to be all brass teaching.

Masterworks Listening Exams

• For each instrument, there will be <u>8-10</u> masterworks presented. At the conclusion of each unit, there will be a subsequent listening identification exam. You may listen to the recording of your choice for each unit, but recordings will be available on Webcourses@UCF.

Student Presentations

- Group presentations on Brass Societies
 You and your group will investigate and research the various societies for and about brass instruments. Each group will share their findings on October 23.
- Individual Presentation on Literature
 You will select a solo work for your instrument, either accompanied or unaccompanied,
 that was not examined in class. You will be assigned a day to present your literature topic
 to the class for discussion. Be sure to provide an analysis of the work as well as any
 significant biographical information. The presentation should be approximately 5-10
 minutes.

Brass Literature & Pedagogy Notebook.

• Every student will assemble a notebook to turn in at the end of the semester. This notebook will serve as your final examination. The portfolio content will be a compilation of all the literature and pedagogy projects completed by the class. The end result will be a portfolio that provides you with the resources and materials to teach any brass instrument at the beginning/intermediate levels. The notebook can be turned in physically or digitally – but must be organized.

Plagiarism

In an instructional setting, plagiarism occurs when a writer deliberately uses someone else's language, ideas, or other original (not common-knowledge) material without acknowledg-ing its source. This definition applies to texts published in print or on-line, to manuscripts, and to the work of other student writers.

Misuse of Sources

A student who attempts (even if clumsily) to identify and credit his or her source, but who misuses a specific citation format or incorrectly uses quota-tion marks or other forms of identifying material taken from other sources, has not plagiarized. Instead, such a student should be considered to have failed to cite and document sources appropri-ately.
