Course goals-overarching goals for the course:

- **Understand the collaborative environment of the creation of theatre**
- **Recognize the importance, value, and development of theatre in society**
- **Develop a personal standard to delineate between good and bad theatre**
- **Have a general understanding of the various elements involved in show production**

Objectives-students should be able to:

- **Identify types of theatrical performance**
- **Read a script for story, style and genre**
- **Critique a performance of a play**
- **Understand the process of creating a theatrical production**
- **Understand the function & conventions of a theatrical audience & display appropriate audience behavior**
- **Connect major characteristics within the genres of western theatre to their cultural context.**

Required Reading:

The deadlines for these activities will be listed on our schedule. This is a textbook, a digital textbook and it is a requirement.**

1. Holly Down In Heaven, by K.C. (a play script) available at our UCF Bookstore or on Amazon. It is listed between \$5.10 - \$11.35.

2. Beyond the 4th Wall, by H.M. (a digital textbook).

You will need to purchase an access code for this digital text.

If you purchase it directly from the publisher, the cost is \$85.00

If you purchase it from the UCF Bookstore, the cost is \$109.30

If you would like to purchase it from the publisher, these are the directions:

1. go to www.grtep.com

2. Under - first time user, click "click here to purchase"
3. It will ask you for the institution, enter "The University of Central Florida"
4. It will ask you for the online publication, enter "Beyond the 4th Wall"
5. Then it will request payment (\$85.00) and for you to create an online account.

When you register in *Beyond the 4th Wall*, register your name **EXACTLY** how it appears in *Web-Courses*. **It is your responsibility to register for the correct section. No exceptions.
